

a. Motion: Amend the NRA High Power Rifle Rule Book by striking Section 23 in its entirety and hereby amends Section 3 (Equipment and Ammunition) of the NRA High Power Rifle Rule Book by inserting a new subsection 3.3.2 therein to read as follows:

“3.3.2 AR Tactical Mid-Range Prone Rifle -

AR Tactical Mid-Range Prone Rifles used for Mid-Range Prone competitions are divided into two categories, AR-Military & Police (AR-M&P) and AR-Any Rifle (AR-Any). As the name implies, these rifles are fired from the prone position during Mid-Range competition at 300, 500 and 600 yards on standard High Power Rifle targets.

(a) AR-Military & Police Rifle (AR-M&P): Any semi-automatic centerfire rifle constructed on an AR-Style Platform chambered in either (1) 5.56mm/.223 caliber or (2) 7.62mm/.308 caliber.

(b) AR-Any Rifle (AR-Any): Any semi-automatic centerfire rifle constructed on an AR-Style Platform in any bore diameter not less than .223cal./5.56mm and not exceeding .308cal./7.63 mm. Magnums are permitted.

(c) Barrel. Actual barrel length may not exceed 22.0”, not including the suppressor, if any. Suppressors are permitted in jurisdictions where civilian ownership and use are permitted by law. Factory-installed flash hiders are permitted. Muzzle brakes, compensators, and tuners are prohibited.

(d) Trigger. Only military-style triggers are permitted. Minimum trigger-pull weight may not be less than 4.5 pounds.

(e) Sights. Optical sights (scopes) are permitted but may not exceed 16x magnification. Taping is permitted. Metallic sights (irons) are permitted. All other sighting systems are prohibited.

(f) Stock. The buttstock and cheek piece must be symmetrical and in line with the centerline of the bore. Tactical stocks that allow for adjustment of length of pull and cheek-piece height are permitted. Butt plates may be adjustable for height but must be vertical and perpendicular to bore centerline. Pistol grips are permitted but may not extend more than 6 inches below the centerline of the bore and may not be equipped with a hand rest or orthopedic grip.

(g) Reduced Capacity Magazines. Reduced capacity magazines (sleds) are permitted.

(h) Maximum weight. The rifle, scope, bipod, suppressor (if any), sling (if any), and empty magazine may not exceed 14 pounds in overall weight.

(i) Front Rest. The front rest is limited to a Harris-style folding/collapsible bipod. Bipod legs may be adjustable for height but must be capable of folding up parallel to the stock. Bipods which are adjustable for elevation and/or windage between shots by use of a “joystick” or other similar device are prohibited. Bipods with swivel tops are permitted. Slings are permitted but may not be used in conjunction with a bipod.

(j) Rear Rest. A rear rest consisting of a soft bag without ears or special shaping is permitted but not required.

(Revisor’s Note: With the addition of this new subsection, AR-Tactical Mid-Range Prone national records may now be set and recognized as provided elsewhere in these Rules and AR Tactical Mid-Range Prone Rifles may now be included as a rifle category in NRA Mid-Range Prone National Matches championship events.)”

b. Motion: Amend the NRA High Power Rifle Rulebook as follows:

Amend Section 7 (Courses of Fire) by adding thereto a new subsection 7.26 to read as follows:

“7.26. Long Range (Optional) Bisley-Style Courses of Fire (2 or 3 shooters per target, alternating, 45 seconds per shot per shooter)

- (a) Prone 1,000 yards, Tgt.-LR, 2 convertible sighters, 20 record rounds
- (b) Prone 1,000 yards, 60 rounds, three- match aggregate
- (c) Prone 1000 yards, Tgt.-LR, 2 convertible sighters, 15 shots for record
- (d) Prone 1000 yards, 45 round, three-match aggregate

Amend Section 17 (National Records) by adding thereto a new subsection 17.5 to read as follows:

“17.26. Long Range (Optional) Bisley-Style Courses of Fire.

- (a) Single match, 20 record rounds – See Rule 7.26(a)

- (b) Three-Match Aggregate, 60 record rounds – See Rule 7.26(b).
- (c) Single match, 15 record rounds – See Rule 7.26(c)
- (d) Three-Match Aggregate, 45 record rounds – See Rule 7.26(d).”

Amend the Glossary of the NRA High Power Rifle Rule Book by adding thereto the term “Bisley Style” as follows:

“‘Bisley Style’ means when two or three competitors are detailed to fire at the same target. They fire in rotation alternately starting with the right hand competitor and keep score for one another.”

c. Motion: Amend the NRA High Power Rifle Rule Book as follows:

Amend Rule 3(1)(c) by adding the underlined language to the ninth bullet point, as shown here: “Only standard A1 or A2 type or similarly shaped symmetrical pistol grips with no orthopedic features such as thumb rests or palm shelves may be used.

Amend Rule 3(1)(c) by striking all after the first sentence in the sixth bullet point and inserting in lieu thereof the underlined language as shown here:

Metal or synthetic (polymer) magazines, standard issue, or commercial equivalent, straight or curved, must be attached during the firing of all courses and in all positions. Allowable magazines and single round loading devices may vary in length and curvature provided that they do not exceed 7 ¾ inches from top to bottom as measured along the back of the spine. Reduced capacity magazines which are shorter than standard 20-round magazines are permitted, provided that they must have a fluorescent orange, yellow or similar bright color magazine identifying strip on the lower portion of the magazine which is visible when fully inserted into the receiver. Magazines must not have any additional pads, extensions, or other support features. Alterations to the magazine to allow the use of cartridges exceeding SAAMI OAL specifications are permitted.

Amend Rule 3(1)(c) by adding at new bullet point at the end to read as follows: “Extended charging handles are permitted.”

Amend Rule 3.2 by deleting the words “Schuetzen type butt-plates and palm rests” as they appear in the first sentence of the original.

Amend Rule 3.3.1(a) by adding the following language at the end of (a): “; cartridge case and limited to bullets weights not to exceed 156 grains for .308/7.62mm and 91 grains for .223/5.56mm.”

Amend Rule 3.3.1(b) by striking the original in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following: “Any service rifle with metallic or optical sights, that are in compliance with Rule 3.1, chambered for the unmodified .308/7.62mm NATO or .223/5.56 NATO cartridge case, with no bullet weight restrictions.”

Amend Rule 3.9.1 by striking the existing language in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following: “Personal Wind Indicators – Personal wind indicators of all types are prohibited forward of the ready line.”

Amend Rule 3.16.1 by striking subsection (a) in its entirety.

Amend Rule 3.22 by striking the Note in its entirety and adding a new sub-subsection (e) to read as follows: “Only match officials may communicate between the line and the pits during firing. However, team members on the official team roster may communicate among themselves on the line during team firing.”

Amend Rule 4.1.3 pertaining to NRA certification of electronic targets by striking that Rule in its entirety.

Amend Rule 6.3 to read as follows: “The firing point may be protected with a roof but may not be fully enclosed. This does not preclude the construction of ranges with walls and/or barriers designed to reduce or channel noise so as to protect surrounding or adjacent properties from noise pollution or the use of baffling to protect against the possibility of rounds escaping from the range.”

Amend Section 7 pertaining to Courses of fire by adding a new Rule 7.26 to read as follows: “In the case of multi-day National Championship courses of fire, the order and timing of fire may be amended or changed by the Match Director through use a Match Director’s Bulletin in order to maintain the spirit of competition as the result of changing weather conditions or other circumstances requiring flexibility in scheduling. The Match Director shall at all times keep the health, safety and welfare of the competitors and the spirit of competition and fairness as the overall deciding factors when making such decisions.”

Amend Rule 7.25 by adding thereto a new subsection 7.25(A) to read as follows:

“7.25(A). Alternative Mid-Range National Championship Match Course of Fire:

Days 1, 2, 3 & 4      Prone 3x20 Slow 600 yds      MR-1”

Amend Rule 9.1 by striking the existing Rule in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following: “A competitor may change rifles to another of the same or different caliber only between fired matches or between stages of a multiple stage match even if these stages

are included in an aggregate match. A competitor may not change rifles during the firing of a single stage match unless it has become disabled and has been so designated by the Chief range Officer. For the purpose of this rule, the firing of a stage is considered to have started when the competitor has fired their first record shot. A claim that a rifle is disabled must be made immediately. All shots fired up to the time of the claim is made will stand as part of the official score. See Rules 10.9 and 10.10.”

Amend Rule 9.6(a) by striking the original language in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

“9.6(a) - In Rapid Fire, no alibis shall be granted for any reasons. Competitors may attempt to safely clear a malfunction and continue firing. If the competitor is unable to fire the prescribed number of shots within the time limit, the unfired shots (saved rounds) shall be scored as misses (M).”

Amend Rule 9.6(b) adding two sub-subsections as follows:

“(i) A malfunction that results in a shot being fired before the command LOAD has been given and before the preparation period has begun shall result in disqualification from that match and may, at the discretion of the Match Director, result in disqualification from the tournament.

(ii) A malfunction that results in a being fired during the preparation period shall be scored as a shot for record and a miss.

Amend Rule 14.6 by adding thereto new sub-subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows:

“(a). A shot fired down range during the preparation period shall be scored as a shot for record and a miss.

(b). A shot fired before the preparation period and before the command “LOAD” has been given shall result in disqualification from that match; and, depending upon the potential danger created by that action, disqualification from the tournament at the discretion of the Match Director.”

Amend Rule 9.10 by striking the reference to Rule 19.4.1 and adding “...except during matches with unlimited sighting shots prior to the competitor going for record.”

Amend Rule 10.1.8 by striking the original in its entirety (but leaving the “Note:” which follows the Rule) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

“If a range ceases fire during the firing of a relay in individual matches, one sighting shot will be allowed when firing resumes. If an individual competitor is delayed over 2 consecutive minutes through no fault of their own and is allowed additional firing time

during the firing of an individual match one sighting shot will be allowed when their firing starts again. In both of the instances described above, the competitor will be given one-minute additional time. The competitor has the option of firing a sighter and must inform the score keeper that he or she either is or is not going to fire a sighter before the shot is fired. If a sighter is fired, it must be recorded on the score card by the scorekeeper. This applies to all individual matches whether or not sighters were given at the start of the match.”

Amend Rule 11.8 by striking the fourth sentence which reads “No member of the National Championship Protest Committee may be a competitor in that tournament,” and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

“Whenever possible, the National Championship Protest Committee should be comprised of knowledgeable individuals who are not competitors in that tournament. However, if circumstances so require, the National Championship Protest Committee may be comprised of one or more individuals who are competitors but who are not in any way affected by the outcome of the controversy in question and who have no team or club relationship with any of the competitors involved in the controversy in question. Any member of the National Protest Committee who believes they have a conflict, an appearance of a conflict, or who believes that they cannot fairly decide the controversy in quest must immediately recuse themselves from that question.”

Amend Rule 11.2 pertaining to referees by adding the following to the beginning of the first sentence of the Rule: “Whenever possible, ...”

Amend Rule 11.2 by adding at the end of the existing rule the following:

“When a referee has not been assigned as set forth above, a Supervisor may be used and when neither a referee nor a supervisor is available a jury shall be appointed and shall perform such functions of the referee as may be appropriate under the circumstances then existing. See Rules 11.0, 11.2.1 and 11.3”

Amend Section 11 of the NRA High Power Rifle Rule Book by adding thereto a new Rule 11.0 to read as follows:

“It is absolutely imperative that all NRA High Power Rifle Competitions be conducted in a fair, impartial, and competent manner. Tournament officials play a vital role in achieving that goal. NRA Rules must be administered and enforced with the utmost integrity, free from even the appearance of partiality. Rules must be administered and enforced fairly and consistently. Referees, Supervisors and Juries are charged with ensuring that the Rules are applied fairly and equally across the full spectrum of tournament participants. Referees should be assigned to major tournaments whenever available. When referees are not

available clubs and tournament hosts may utilize the services of a Supervisor. When neither a referee nor a supervisor is available, a Jury may be used.”

Amend Rule 11.3 pertaining to Supervisors by striking the first sentence, removing all references to “Approved Tournaments,” and adding at the end of the existing rule the words “See Rule 11.0.”

Amend Section 11 by striking Rule 11.4 pertaining to “Range Director” in its entirety.

Amend Rule 11.6 by inserting the words “When assigned,” before the words “The Chief Statistical Officer as it appears at the beginning of the first sentence.

Amend Rule 11.6.7 by adding a new sub-subsection (c) to read as follows:

“(c) Match Directors may utilize specialized squadding where tournament conditions so require such as when shoot-offs for designated trophies are to be conducted.”

Amend Rule 11.8 by striking the current rule in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

“11.8. National Championship Protest Committee- A National Championship Protest Committee will be appointed by the Match Director in any NRA National Championship. When appointed, decisions on Protests by that Committee at the Championship are final, without appeal to the NRA Protest Committee. However, all such decisions of the Championship Protest Committee shall be submitted to the NRA Protest Committee for review. Where the interests of fundamental fairness and justice so dictate and require, the NRA Protest Committee may alter, amend, or reverse the decision of the Championship Protest Committee. When possible, cases of suspension from competition arising from an incident in a Championship, the Championship Protest Committee may not act, but must forward a recommendation to the NRA Protest Committee. Members of the National Championship Protest Committee should not be a competitor in that tournament except under circumstances where that person has no interest or conflict in the controversy to be decided and where the parties affected agree to that person’s service.

In the event a duly qualified three-person National Championship Protest Committee cannot be empaneled or was not empaneled, the NRA Protest Committee shall exercise primary jurisdiction over protests arising during that specific national championship tournament.

National Championship Protest Committee members must be knowledgeable and experienced in NRA High Power Rifle competition.

A protest procedure must begin no later than one hour after completion of firing for the day. In the case of awards, the protest must begin no later than one hour after the completion of the awards ceremony. A protest procedure begins when the protest is filed in writing with the Match Director or other designated match official.”

Amend the High Power Rifle Rule Book by striking Section 22 “F-Class Rifle Rules” in its entirety.

Amend Appendix B(8) by striking same in its entirety.

Amend Appendix C(7) by striking same in its entirety.

Amend Appendix B(9) by striking the existing rule in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

“9. NRA Referee. A qualified and duly certified NRA referee should be assigned to all NRA National Championships, NRA Regional Championships, NRA State Championships, and all Registered tournaments of national or regional significance. Where a referee is not available the Match Director may appoint a duly qualified Supervisor. Where neither a referee or supervisor is available, then a jury shall be appointed and shall be responsible for the enforcement and administration of these rules.”

Amend Appendix C(8) by striking the existing rule in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following: “9. NRA Referee. See Appendix B(9)”

Amend Appendix (B)(11) by striking the words “An SR-1 card or SR-1” as they appear before the word “Report” as they appear in the first sentence of that sub-subsection.

Amend Rule 14.10(c)(3) by striking the original in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following: “If the competitor fired the required number of shots in the required time and eleven (11) or twelve (12) hits are found on the target, the competitor will receive the value of the ten (10) hits of the highest value with no option to re-fire the string. All hits will be spotted on the target and the value of all hits will be indicated on the scoreboard and the scorekeeper will record the value of the highest ten (10) hits. (see rules 9.25 & 14.3.1)

Amend Rule 17.5 by adding thereto a new sub-subsection (am) to read as follows:

“(am) Alternative National Championship Mid-Range Course of Fire:

See Rule 7.25(A) – Four-day Aggregate – 240 shots - 600 yards slow-fire prone”

d. Motion: Amend Section 10 of the High Power Rifle Rule Book as follows:

AMEND Rule 10.17 by striking the last sentence and inserting in lieu thereof the following: “When the system so allows, the individual competitor’s system should be set to the bullet diameter currently being used by that competitor, otherwise the default setting on such systems must be set at .308 caliber.”

AMEND Rule 10.17.3 by striking the original in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

“10.17.3 - Procedure for Managing Electronic Scoring Target System Failure

In the event of failure of the Electronic Scoring target System Failure

(a) The time of the failure and the time remaining must be recorded by a Range Officer.

(b) All completed competition shots of each competitor must be counted and recorded. In the event of a power failure, this may involve waiting until the power supply is restored to enable the number of shots registered by the target, not necessarily on the firing point monitor, to be established.

(c) If the Electronic Scoring target SYSTEM cannot be repaired within two (2) consecutive minutes, after the failure is rectified and the full range is in operation, rule 10.1.8 (Interrupted Fire) will apply.”

AMEND Rule 10.17.4 by striking the original in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

“10.17.4 – Procedure for Managing an Electronic Scoring Target in the Event of a Disputed Shot That Was Recorded.

A competitor may challenge any shot for value recorded.

(a) In the event a competitor fires a shot in which they dispute the value recorded, the competitor must immediately inform the nearest Range Officer of the disputed shot and their challenge of value. One or more Range Officers must go to the firing position for the purpose of noting the time of the challenge and remaining time. The disputed shot’s value and shot number will be noted by the scorekeeper and Range Officer and will remain on the scorecard.

(b) Upon receiving the challenge, The Range Officer will direct the competitor to fire one additional shot as a provisional. This shot will be immediate if in string fire competition, or in due turn if Bisley-style firing.

(c) The provisional shot's score will also be entered/recorded as a record shot onto the scorecard by the Range Officer, and the shooter will then be directed to continue to fire. (One extra shot should/will be shown on the scorecard, at the completion of firing of the match, for each provisional shot). At the completion of firing of the competitor's relay, the Range Officer will review all available technical data in the Electronic Scoring target system and will make the determination whether the disputed shot's value (challenge denied), or the provisional shot's value (challenge accepted), is the final recorded competition shot value.

(d) Once the determination is made, the Range Officer will update the Electronic target and will direct the scorekeeper to update the scorecard.

AMEND Section 10 by adding thereto a new Rule 10.17.5 to read as follows:

“10.17.5 - Procedure for Managing an Electronic Scoring Target in the Event of a Disputed Shot That Does Not Record.

A competitor may challenge any shot that is fired that does NOT record on their assigned Electronic Scoring target. See Rule 16.1(g)

(a) In the event a competitor fires a shot which does not record on the Electronic Scoring system, the competitor must immediately inform the nearest Range Officer of the missing shot. One or more Range Officers must go to the firing position for the purpose of noting the time of the complaint, remaining time, and determining whether the competitor has missed the target, cross-fired, or the target has malfunctioned.

(1) If the Electronic Scoring Target System has the capability to indicate a “measured off target miss” and it does indicate this on either the competitor's assigned target, or either adjacent target, in response to a shot, a miss (M) will be inserted by the Range Officer into the competitor's scorecard.

(2) If a crossfire is identified by the Range Officer, a miss (M) will be entered/recorded on the competitor's scorecard.

(3) If no “measured off target miss” or crossfire can be immediately identified, a miss (M) will be entered/recorded onto the competitor's scorecard.

(b) The competitor may now challenge the miss (M) score entered/recorded based on any of the three scenarios as defined in 10.17.5(a).

(c) Upon receiving the challenge, The Range Officer will direct the competitor to fire one (1) additional shot as a provisional. This shot will be immediate if in string fire competition, or in due turn if firing Bisley-Style.

(1) If the provisional shot records, the Range Officer and scorekeeper will note the number of the shot and the shot's value will be entered/recorded on the score card and the shooter will then be directed to continue to fire. (One (1) extra shot should/will be shown on the scorecard, at the completion of firing of the match, for each provisional shot). At the completion of firing of the competitor's relay, the Range Officer will review all available technical data in the Electronic Scoring target system and will make the determination whether the entered/recorded miss (M) (challenge denied), or the provisional shot's value (challenge accepted), is the final recorded competition shot value.

Once that determination is made, the Range Officer will update the Electronic Scoring system and will direct the scorekeeper to update the score card.

(2) In Bisley-Style firing, if the provisional shot does not record, but the partner's shots are recording, then the competitor will be deemed to have missed twice, two (2) misses (M's) will be recorded on the scorecards, and the relay will continue. A competitor whose shots are failing to record will only be allowed four (4) consecutive shots that fail to record, which after the competitor will be required to retire under rule 9.6.2.

(3) In single string fire, if the provisional shot does not record, and the Electronic Scoring target cannot be confirmed to be functional or be repaired within two (2) consecutive minutes the competitor may be moved to a reserve position, or may be assigned to fire on a reasonable alternative target.

(d) All completed competition shots of each competitor must be counted and recorded. In the event of a power failure, this may involve waiting until the power supply is restored to enable the number of shots registered by the target, not necessarily on the firing point monitor, to be established.

(1) If the target can be confirmed to be functional, preferably by having another competitor fire two (2) or more shots onto it and it properly records all shots, both previous misses (M's) previously entered/recorded as misses by the scorekeeper and Ranger Officer are confirmed as competition (record) shots, the competitor will resume shooting. If this confirmation process takes more than two (2) consecutive minutes, Rule 10.1.8 (Interrupted fire) applies. The competitor will only be allowed a total of four (4) consecutive shots that fail to record, which after the competitor will be required to retire under rule 9.6.2.

(2) If the target is confirmed not to be functional, the competitor will be moved to a reserve position or may be assigned to fire on a reasonable alternative target. When moved into a reserve position, once in position, the competitor will be given three (3) minutes of preparation additional time, and their time will restart.

If the first shot on the newly assigned target:

- (a) Records - it will be entered/recorded as a non-convertible sighting shot and scoring will continue from the point reached prior to the first miss.
- (b) Does not record - the competitor will, if range rules allow, fire one additional shot.
- (c) If this second shot does not record, the shooter will be required to retire under rule 9.6.2.
- (d) If this second shot records, the competitor will be credited with misses (M's) for all three (3) previously unrecorded shots and will then continue to fire until the competitor's relay is completed."

AMEND Section 10 by adding a new Rule 10.17.6 to read as follows:

"10.17.6 – Procedure for Managing Electronic Scoring Target System in the Event of a Crossfire.

In the event a crossfire is identified, rule 10.17.5(a)(2) and rule 14.7:

(a) Confirmed crossfires of shots must be entered/recorded as misses (M) for the competitor firing the shot.

(1) If the competitor firing a confirmed crossfire shot is in their sighting shots, they may be allowed no more sighting shots.

(b) If the competitor receiving a crossfire shot disclaims/challenges the shot on their target, they must report this immediately to the Range Officer prior to firing another shot.

(1) If the Range Officer confirms that the competitor receiving the shot did not fire the disputed shot, (challenge accepted) the shot/recorded score must be deleted. If this confirmation and deletion of the shot on the competitor's target takes more than two (2) consecutive minutes, rule 10.1.8 (Interrupted Fire) applies.

(2) If the Range officer cannot confirm beyond all reasonable doubt that the competitor did not fire the disputed/challenged shot, (challenge denied) the shot must be credited to the competitor and must remain recorded. If this confirmation takes more than two (2) consecutive minutes, rule 10.1.8 (Interrupted Fire) applies.

(3) If the competitor receiving the crossfire shot(s) is firing his sighting shots, and the sighting shots were limited in the relay, the Range Officer will allow them an additional sighting shot, and additional time. (rule 14.10(b) – Excessive hits).

(c) If shots are fired indistinguishably by the competitor on the assigned Electronic Scoring target and a different competitor, both shots received by the Electronic Scoring target will be shown on the target. Upon the posting of the second shot by the Electronic Scoring target on the target face and on the scorecard, the competitor must immediately inform the nearest Range Officer of the extra shot, thereby submitting a challenge. One or more Range Officers must go to the firing position for the purpose of noting the time of the complaint, remaining time, and confirming the extra shot on the target. Upon acceptance of the challenge (challenge will be automatically accepted as it is impossible for the competitor to fire two shots indistinguishable from each other):

(1) Of the two shots shown on the target, the Range Officer will score/record the shot of higher value and will remove the shot of lower value.

(2) The competitor will be allowed, if requested by the competitor, to fire one non-convertible sighting shot and receive extra time, and then the competition (record) shots will resume.”

AMEND Section 10 by deleting therefrom Rules 10.17.7 and 10.17.8 in their entirety.

e. Motion: Amend Section 16 of the High Power Rifle Rule Book by adding thereto a new sub-subsection 16.1(g) to read as follows:

“16.1(g) – When targets are scored using an Electronic Scoring target, any challenge must be made immediately to a Range Officer on the line, prior to firing any additional shots or the competitor will lose the opportunity to fire a provisional shot.”

f. Motion: Amend Rule 14.10(b)(1) of the High Power Rifle Rule Book by adding the following to the end of the existing language:

“14.10(b)(1) “... If the competitor so requests, they will be allowed to fire one (1) non-convertible sighter, receive extra time, and the resume firing for record.”
